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

- This appears to be a Wikipedia of accounting textbooks. There is intermediate and advanced accounting
 concepts interspersed with fundamental concepts. A typical student would be overwhelmed by the
 different concepts being introduced before they understand the basics.
- Most beginning textbooks have a sequential method of developing a foundation in accounting. There is
 not a sequence here and it would be difficult for me to piece together the particular sections that I
 would want the students to pay attention to and those that the beginning student should ignore. It
 would be faster for me to just write the text.
