Please provide comments on any aspect of the subject matter of this textbook:

- The textbook covers all the relevant areas of a business law course, including constitutional law, crimes, torts, contracts, negotiable instruments, agency and real estate. It would provide all the information necessary to a student for this type of course.
- However, I think this textbook focuses too much on the court system and the legal process. Chapter 3 could be shortened significantly--when I was reading this chapter, I felt like I was back in the Civil Procedure class in law school. Undergraduate students do not need this much detail. Additionally, there were sections in Chapter 6 that continued to talk about the court system and legal process.
- In Chapter 4, I think there was too much focus on the development of the commerce clause. All a student needs to know is (1) what is the commerce clause, and (2) how does it affect interstate commerce.
- I loved Chapter 6 on crimes. It talked about each crime and gave a summary of what it took to be convicted of the crime. I would focus a little more on mens rea (the required bad intent) though.
- Overall, the subject matter was presented in a reasonable fashion--nothing to detailed, but just enough to cover the topic.

Please provide comments on any aspect of the instructional design of this textbook:

- The textbook is slightly basic in its language. It could be a bit more sophisticated in its wording. I felt like I was reading a dumbed-down textbook at a few points.
- The visual presentation of this textbook is not very good. The fonts are not consistent throughout the textbook. If this textbook was printed out, it would be pages and pages of white, with very little color interspersed.
- There is no table of contents. This is an absolute must for any textbook. Students needs to know how the textbook is going to proceed. I spent too much time trying to figure out what topics were presented in this textbook.
- The self-test questions and answers are much too basic and are not thorough whatsoever. This textbook

seems designed to cover the basics of the law, but doesn't focus much on the exceptions within the law. (And exceptions are where the real law is.) More self-test questions (and not just simple multiple-choice questions) are required to assist students with the materials.

• I am not a fan of presenting the entire text of two or three case opinions at the end of each chapter. At this level, students are not interested in reading the entire case. I think a better way to present the materials would be boxes within the text which summarize key cases. This way, students are reading only the relevant portions of the cases that matter. And, it helps to break up the long sections of text within the textbook.

Overall Comments

If you were to recommend this textbook to colleagues, what merits of the textbook would you highlight?

• The textbook gives a good overview of all topics of business law. Many of the chapters are written such that the basic information is presented easily, without too much clutter or focus on exceptions. It is written in an accessible manner which makes it easy to read.

What areas of this textbook require improvement in order for it to be used in your courses?

- While the textbook is focused on the basics of business law, it often omits many of the exceptions which form a large part of business law. This textbook needs to add case summaries within the text to help illustrate the law, and not just rely on the full opinions of cases at the end of each chapter.
- Additionally, the formatting of the online textbook is off. Text is not appropriately aligned and there are erroneous white spaces all over the textbook.
- There appears to be no real companion materials for this textbook, including test banks. It is an adequate textbook for the basics, but it has a general feel of being cheap.
