


Faculty Review of Open eTextbooks



- As a reviewer for "Calculus II---Early Transcendentals", I only deal with the integration part of the textbook, i.e., Chapter 7 to 11. Since this version put the transcendental function chapter in the first part, it has nothing to do with this class. This is good for the semester system. For the quarter system, the reviewer would suggest the instructor to use the "late transcendentals" version. That is exactly what we are doing in UCR.
- Personally, I found that most contents in this textbook is proper, except that the authors should possibly
 put more details in the antiderivatives before letting students apply them to the definite integrals by the
 Fundamental Theorem of the Calculus. One might also use slides in the teaching, which might be easily
 adjusted to the textbook.
- Nowadays, the most universities might only use the textbook for the lectures and try to reduce the cost of
 the textbook for the students. An ebook which is free is very desirable for the students. We usually use
 other material for the quizzes, homework and tests. If there could be more connection among these
 material, that would be more helpful.
