


Faculty Review of Open eTextbooks

- There are examples and exercises for each section of the text. The exercises are limited in scope and rigor. Although applications are presented, the number of applications is much less than your typical paid textbook. The number of exercises for each section varies from 10 to 30, and should be supplemented with additional problems.

- The textbook is not organized like most typical calculus textbooks. The authors deal with curve sketching before they discuss the product, quotient, and chain rule for derivatives. So, it follows that the functions that are sketch are simple polynomial and rational functions that do not require any complicated derivatives. The derivative as a rate of change is not discussed until after optimization and curve sketching.
- There are no ancillaries for this textbook. The textbook contains exercises. The answers are in the back of the text.

• This textbook is well-written. It would be easy for a student to follow. It covers all of the topics required for a first-semester calculus class.

What areas of this textbook require improvement in order for it to be used in your courses?

- The order in which the topics are presented are not typical for a calculus textbook, so the instructor may need to re-arrange the topics.
- There is a limited number of exercises for each section. I would like to see an increase in the number of exercises, along with more rigor in the examples and exercises.
