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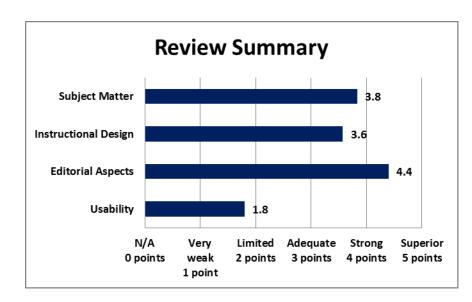

 There is nothing mentioned of Mexican-American labor movements of the early 1900s, their treatment during the Great Depression, or the post-WWII era civil rights actions. Likewise, there is little mention of Native Americans after the 1890s. Even their civil rights actions of the 1960s and 1970s are nominally covered.

It is somewhat confusing to be reading about Teddy Roosevelt's and Woodrow Wilson's actions of the early 1900s when they are not really introduced to students until the following chapter on empire. Some images did not load. I could not see where test banks or exercises were available.

• The content is well-written, and most of the chapters are well-organized. The features mentioned above do help link History to the present day, as well as offer more individual views of major events.

What areas of this textbook require improvement in order for it to be used in your courses?

All of the chapters download; it cannot be separated into pre-Reconstruction or post-Reconstruction. That
means you have to scroll through several chapters to get to the ones you want or need. More content on
Hispanics/Mexican-Americans and Native Americans is needed.
