


Faculty Review of Open eTextbooks



- The content is very standard. Examples are similar to ones found in other precalculus textbooks.
- This is a function-based precalculus textbook. It does a very good job of dealing with all the functions outlined in the C-ID descriptor content for this class.
- It does a poor job of discussing equations. There are few exercises dealing with equations and examples on how to [do] some equations are nonexistent. It does not cover equations and inequalities.
- The instructor will need to supplement the textbook to meet C-ID descriptor course content 6 & 7. However, it does cover all the objectives outline in the C-ID descriptor.

Please provide comments on any aspect of the instructional design of this textbook:

- The content flow of the textbook is similar to other precalculus texts. There are lots of tables, graphs, and illustrations.
- Examples: There are ample examples in each section. Graphs, tables, and pictures are provided when relevant. Some examples contain "Try It" problems after the example.
- Technology: Examples using scientific and graphing calculators are scattered throughout the text. They are not specific to any brand of calculator. Instructions are not provided. The discussion is general. The instructor will need to supplement with additional calculator instruction.
- Ancillary materials: Every section contains a good collection of exercises at the end. PowerPoint slides
 and an instructor's solution manual is available for instructor download. Students can download the
 student solutions manual for free. Online homework systems are also available: WebAssign (\$32.95 for
 single use comes with ebook); xyzHomework (unknown annual subscription price).
- Navigation: The CTRL-F function (Windows) works for searching for key words and phrases in the
 textbook. The table of contents is linked to the respective sections of the textbook. When a prior
 example is referenced, the text is linked to the reference so the reader can directly jump back to that part
 of the text. The index is also linked to the page numbers shown. Overall, navigation is very good for a PDF
 file.
