


Faculty Review of Open eTextbooks



- I so wanted to love Boundless. Last year, when I discovered it, it seemed to be the answer to my prayers: a cheap alternative to Stokstad, which I have used for several years. At first glance, my hopes were high: format was clear with stated objectives, key points, important terms followed by text. The images looked superb on my computer screen, and the font size and spacing was attractive. The table of contents was inclusive and wide ranging. Then I started reading. I found the writing to be plodding and dull.
- Certainly not Stokstad, which is quite good. Not Fichner-Rathus, not Gardner, all of which Boundless purports to offer "alternatives" for, but actually just rearranges the table of contents. I noticed some typos (craved instead of carved, "manuscripsca" for manuscripts) and some linked terms that really don't need to be underlined ("viewer"...really?) as it tends to slow the reader down. But then I came to all the added features meant to customize the course and got lost. I'm using an iPad for this process, which might explain part of the problem, but I'd say there's a lot of navigation and clicks one needs to wade through before getting to where you want to go, which strains one's patience. Maybe you really can customize, assign and rearrange the quizzes for your class, but I often lost the whole page with a poorly aimed click. And had some difficulty getting back to the page I was on. It left me frustrated.
