- The text is well designed with key concepts and learning objectives listed at the beginning of each chapter and subchapter.
- Practice worksheets, internet examples, and other asides from the text are highlighted and formatted appropriately.
- Each subchapter ends with key takeaways and exercises. Answer keys to the self-tests are provided directly after the questions.
- Images are used sparingly; there are a few graphs and other visual aids to illustrate concepts when appropriate.
