


Faculty Review of Open eTextbooks



Please provide comments on any aspect of the subject matter of this textbook:

- The text is well written and easy to understand. Examples fit with the theory covered. On some occasions the text could go a little deeper. E.g.: In Demand and Supply in Financial Markets the term "Savings" is used but not thoroughly introduced; in Work It Out (Money Multiplier) the money multiplier is used but it is not shown how it can be derived.
- Sometimes terminology is not used correctly, e.g.: "Smart Money" is used in the context of money supply while it is an investment term; "many people borrow money" (in the money supply section especially it is important to correctly distinguish between "money" and "funds"); "for now (...) we will not put interest income in the balance sheet" (interest income is never recorded in the balance sheet but rather in the Income Statement).

- Tables are well designed and consistent. Diagrams often use standard Excel format and often only one color.
- Here is room for improvement. Most figures are scanned which results in a loss of quality (e.g. dotted shadows around figures).
