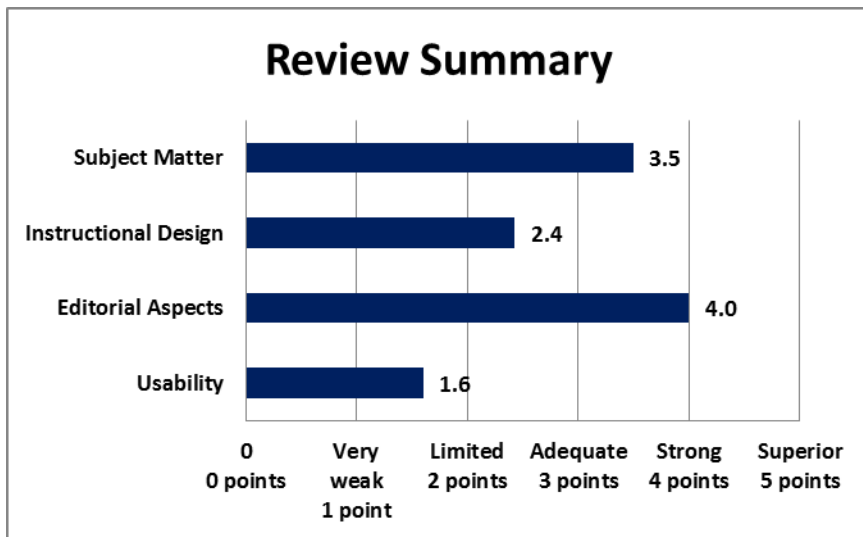

- Overall, it's a great ancillary to instruction, as it gives natural language context to any instruction. It gives a story line that is easy to follow, so students can easily gain knowledge from context if they don't know a word or recognize a verb form or construction. However, this is not a textbook. There is no instruction on how to form verb forms; it is somewhat given to instructors as ancillaries, but not given to students. Also, because this is over 20 years old, it is somewhat out of date on latest pedagogy with respect to foreign language. Communicative methods are still used, but have been greatly tailored to fit various modalities and abilities. This material don't allow for that.

- Easy to navigate, and straightforward progression from one lesson to the next. Very clearly there is a tie-in with the videos; it's impossible to do much of the exercises without knowing what happens in the videos. However, there are only 1-2 exercises per lesson element; 'further practice' consists of links to outside sources, some of which are not recommendable. In order to be considered as a stand-alone text, there needs to be more exercises to be useful.

- I can recommend it as an ancillary, so as to showcase the language in real situations and with a wide range of standard dialects. The amount of cultural lessons is a great addition to any introductory course.

What areas of this textbook require improvement in order for it to be used in your courses?

- It is not a textbook. Overall, it's a good ancillary, but not good for a stand-alone text. For one, there is a companion textbook that gives all of the lessons that aren't on this video. For another, there's been a big update to both the videos and the textbook, which might be something to consider. As this is right now, it's not recommendable as a textbook or as a stand-alone material.
